

**Data needed from the Police/KFOR/DOJ
for the Standards Process regarding ethnic crime**

General questions to keep in mind:

- Who collects and maintains the data – UNMIK police, KPS, KFOR, DoJ, DJA, MPS, OCA?
- How is the data being stored? In a database? Maintained by which agency?
- Is there any public access to this data? Who has access?
- Who will provide the data for the standards process and beyond?

1. ORC request: an overview of how high profile ethnic crimes have been resolved, going back to the start of UNMIK's mission (see possible sample attached)

This should be a chart which has the following data:

- Date of the crime
- Location of the crime
- Brief description of the crime
- Highest charge (e.g., murder, arson)
- Whether a perpetrator was apprehended and charged; if so, status/outcome of the case.

2. Standards on Freedom of Movement and Sustainable Returns and Rights of Communities and their Members:

Where monthly stats requested, back to April 2004 if possible.

Regarding Escorts

General

- Monthly number of requests for military or police escorts
- Monthly number of military or police escorts provided

More Specific

- Monthly number of requests for escorts for visits to social, cultural and religious events [question – how do we count these? By return journey? By number of people being escorted?]
- Monthly number of escorts provided for visits to social, cultural and religious events [question: how do we count these? By number of people being escorted? By number of police or vehicles provided?]

Regarding security incidents

General

- Monthly number of violent incidents directed at community members, including returnees, in comparison with violent crimes directed against the general population
- Monthly number of security incidents occurring during visits of community members to social, cultural and religious events

Specific

- Monthly number of incidents which result in damage to graveyards
- Number of crimes specifically related to freedom of movement of minorities (e.g., stoning of buses or trains)
- Percentage of ethnic crime successfully being prosecuted
- Number of reports made monthly to communities (including returnees) on status of ongoing investigations
- Number of public reports made monthly on the outcome of prosecutions for inter-ethnic crime

Regarding Fixed Check-Points

- Number of fixed KFOR check-points protecting communities

Other related issues

- Percentage of women's representatives incorporated into mechanisms for addressing communities' security needs, such as Crime prevention Council

IV. Standard on the Preservation of Cultural Heritage

- Number of cases investigated and sanctioned relating to intentional destruction and vandalism of cultural heritage sites and items (i) investigated by the Police, (ii) prosecuted and (iii) where final judgements are rendered by the court.
- Percentage of remedies and sanctions, by ethnicity, enforced by the Police and Court.
